## Van weights

You should always make sure the weight of your van doesn't break its official gross weight and axle limits otherwise it will cost you.

Most vans are classed as light goods vehicles (LGVs). These are commercial vehicles with a gross weight (meaning the total weight of you, your passengers, load and fuel) of up to 3.5 tonnes.

All vans weighing less than 3 tonnes are classed as Class 4 for MOT purposes and vans between 3 and 3.5 tonnes as Class 7.

If your van or van and trailer combination is authorised to weigh over 3.5 tonnes, then you may need to apply for a goods vehicle operator's licence. This will mean you can only drive so many hours in a day under drivers' hours and tachograph rules.

You'll also be hit by all kinds of extra UK and European regulations. If you break these rules you could be looking at unlimited fines and up to 2 years in prison\*.

This guide explains how keeping your van legal can save you thousands in lost income, fines and fixed penalties.

Poor condition of your vans could cost your business up to £4,000 per day. This figure is made up of on-thespot penalties and lost revenue.

More than 8 in 10 vehicles DVSA stops are overloaded. More than 6 in 10 have serious mechanical defects, which means you might not be allowed to carry on working that day.

If your van has either of these problems then it will empty your wallet. It could leave you facing a court appearance and even heavier fines.

Don't let the state of your van drag your business and your bottom line down. Use this guide to find out how to keep you and your vehicle on the right side of DVSA and the law.
